Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia (RCF)

Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia (RCF) is a charitable foundation governed by a volunteer Board of Directors. The first community foundation established in NS, RCF was founded under a partnership agreement of Coastal Communities Network and Literacy Nova Scotia with resources provided through The Atlantic Groundfish Strategy (TAGS). RCF was incorporated July 11, 2000, and is the only rural-focused member of the Community Foundations of Canada and a member of Volunteer Canada.

Community Foundations play an important role

Community foundations build and manage endowment funds to support charitable activities in their area and provide community leadership through strategic grant making and project initiatives.



Endowment Building

A community foundation encompasses a collection of endowed funds established by individuals and corporations to enhance the quality of life in a particular area. These funds are pooled and a board of directors supervises the resulting investment portfolio. The income from the portfolio is made available for distribution to support charitable activities in the local community. A fund is the term used to describe a donor's contribution. That contribution will, in the majority of cases, be held in perpetuity in a permanent endowment fund. This means that the capital will not be touched but will be held permanently and only the income made available for distribution. For more details about funds, contact RCF.



Granting

The Rural Communities Foundation of Nova Scotia has been investing in rural Nova Scotia through the following granting programs since 2004.

- Poverty and nutrition focused grants: 23 grants totaling \$18,060
- Housing focused grants: 3 grants totaling \$11,500
- Rural Leadership focused grants: 30 grants totalling \$113,921
- Rural Innovation Grants: 13 grants totaling \$425.090
